Note: This is NOT an exhaustive list; items listed are simply listed FYI. Note: In TX, there is up to a 15-year wait list ("interest list") for Medicaid Waiver programs. Proof of disability is required only <u>after</u> the expiration of the waiting period. Those with FASD generally need assistance with organization/time management/supervision far into adulthood, often lifelong. Accordingly, we recommend that those caring for a youth with FASD proactively include him/her on the wait list. To secure a spot, call 1-877-438-5658 to ask to be placed on the CLASS list AND call the local LIDDA to ask to the placed on the HCS list. To identify & contact your local LIDDA go to http://apps.hhs.texas.gov/contact/search.cfm. During both calls, ask for a confirmation letter to be mailed – and keep that letter!!!

Finances

ARC of Texas (www.thearcoftexas.org) helps those with a disabled family member successfully apply for needed services including financial and residence programs. As of Nov 2019, their State Advocacy Director is Ginger Mayeaux, MSSW, at 512-485-9746 and/or gmayeaux@thearcoftexas.org. ARC also offers a master pooled trust minimizing the cost of a special needs trust.

For Families of Special Needs, Inc., run by TJ Kroehle (www.forfamiliesofspecialneeds.com) assists the disabled and their parents with long-range financial plans, including applying for government programs.

Joint Conservatorship with TX is available to pay for needed residential care, after other means are exhausted. For more information, google TX Dept of Family Services' "Investigation and Referral to DSHS Residential Treatment Center Bed Resource Guide."

TexasABLE (<u>www.TexasABLE.org</u>) offers Texans with disabilities (diagnosed prior to age 26) to save up to \$300K for disability-related expenses without losing eligibility for SSI, Medicaid and certain other pubic benefits.

True Link Cards (www.truelinkfinancial.com) offers debit cards specifically designed for the disabled, allowing users to select the right level of support. They may be structured to work only at specific merchants (like grocery store and utilities), block certain types of transactions (like ATMs & telemarketers) and/or text/email alerts to the parent. They also reportedly use a visual aid that may be helpful for FASD kids.

Youth Empowerment Services (YES Waiver) is a TX Medicaid program providing intense services to prevent out-of-home placement. For more info, contact your county's Local Mental Health Authority (LMHA).

Plano City House runs a Transitional Living Program (<u>www.cityhouse.org</u>) designed for homeless youth age 18 to 21 – so parents must kick the youth out. It allows them to stay in a supervised home for up to 18 months provided they observe rules (no drugs, alcohol, etc.), attend life-skills classes and go to school or work.

<u>Residential Facilities for Youth (FASD Friendly - Also see</u> <u>Transition to Adulthood below)</u>

Brehm Preparatory School (www.brehm.org) near St Louis is a small nonprofit boarding school for grades 6-12+ for students with language-based disorders, memory disorders, processing speed deficits, learning disabilities, emotional dysregulation, anxiety, depression and executive functioning challenges – all common with FASD kids.

Cal Farley (<u>www.calfarley.org</u>) near Amarillo TX offers residential programs for boys and girls age 5-15 at no cost to families.

Devereux Advanced Behavioral Health (www.devereux.org) offers nationwide mental and behavioral health services, including two residential facilities in TX.

Meridell Achievement Center (<u>www.meridell.com</u>) is a psychiatric hospital near Austin TX with a neurobehavioral program appropriate for many FASD youth ages 11 and up.

Teen Challenge (https://teenchallengetx.org) offers reasonably priced year-round TX boarding schools near Austin for youth age 12-17.

Texas Neurorehab Center (<u>www.texasneurorehab.com</u>) is a medical treatment/behavior healthcare facility near Austin TX offering brain injury and residential psychiatric treatment for youth.

Heroes (www.heroesdfw.org) in Richardson offers day camps, respite overnights, retreats, transition services and more for disabled teens, young adults, and their families.

Job Corps (https://www.jobcorps.gov) is a nationwide residential program for youth age 16-24 (or older with documented disability) needing education and job training. The programs last 8-24 months, and serve over 101K youth annually in over 100 centers. It is free to income eligible students.

Landmark College (<u>www.landmark.edu</u>) in Vermont caters to students "with learning disabilities ...ADHD, and autism."

OPTIONS (<u>www.experienceOPTIONS.org</u>) in southern Illinois accepts FASD kids and offers employment readiness, independent living instruction, college support, and other services to those transitioning to adulthood.

Person-Centered Practices (www.person-centered-practices.org), and/or Microboards (www.vela.org) establishes a committed group of family members and friends to meet periodically to assist the disabled in planning/managing their life: finances, employment, residence, social outlets, etc. This assists, and ultimately replaces, the parents' role.

Plano City House (https://www.cityhouse.org) offers Youth Resource & Community Outreach for ages 16-21, plus Transitional Living Program for ages 18-21.

Region 10 Ed Service Center of TX is responsible for providing services to all schools and students within its geographic area (North TX). Its Transition Services office (www.region10.org/programs/transition/overview) serves all disabled students – not only those in public school. It offers a resource directory and telephonic advice on local services.

Segue Center of Dallas (https://seguecenter.org) offers full and part-time programs for high school graduates, including assessments and career selection.

Teen Challenge (http://www.fortworthteenchallenge.org and https://teenchallengetx.org) offers residential programs for youth age 18 and up.

Texas ChalleNGe Academy (https://tmd.texas.gov/texas-challenge-academy), run by the TX Nat'l Guard, offers youth age 16-18 a 5½-month free residential program (plus a 12-month nonresidential phase) while completing their education. It offers a taste of military life yet students incur no military commitment.
